Making a Gingerbread House

In many western countries, it's a tradition to make a gingerbread house for Christmas. In SpyBat's assistant's family, it was a family project that took a whole day. On a Saturday during the second half of December, they would make the whole thing from scratch, while listening to all their Chistmas CDs and having a good time together!

The day before, the assistant's mother made the dough. It's absolutely fine to use store bought dough, but the mother has a recipe for a sturdier dough that makes the construction more stable. After the dough rested in the fridge overnight, it was ready to bake with. But the next morning, at first the blueprints had to be finished before the baking could commence. Usually, the assistant's dad had been working on the blueprints for some time, and on Saturday morning they had to be finished and cut out of paper. Then the baking began, and this was the assistant and her sister's main part of the project. Every piece of the blueprint had to be placed on the dough and cut out, with at least one extra piece of everything, and the dough needed to be as evenly rolled out as possible. After baking in the oven, which had to be watched carefully, the pieces sometimes had to be trimmed according to the blueprints, and then they needed to cool down. In the afternoon, when all the baking was done, it was time to assemble the pieces. For this, glue was made out of sugar that was melted in a frying pan on the stove. You had to count on a few fingertips being burned in the process, but this is the most effective edible glue. After all the pieces were put together, it was time to decorate! For this, royal icing was made. Sometimes they put candy on it, but most of the time they just used the icing.







One thing that made this family's gingerbread houses special is that they really put some thought into what they were going to make. Most of the time, they didn't just make a house. They often worked with a theme. Some examples of that are when they made a scene from a children's book by Astrid Lindgren the year the author would have turned 100 years old, when they made the German monument Brandenburger Tour in Berlin the year a German exchange student was living with them, and when they made a model of the Greek temple Parthenon when the assistant was taking a class in Roman and Greek history in school. Some other gingerbread creations they made are a smalltown, a scout camp, a circus, their own house they were living in, and their summer cottage.

After the Christmas holidays are over, it's part of the tradition to smash the gingerbread house and eat it. But to be honest, most of the time it doesn't taste very good. It's been sitting out for weeks and collected a bit of dust, but everyone in SpyBat's assistant's family always ate at least a little piece. The rest was put outside for the birds to feast on, and what the birds didn't want went into the compost.

Most of these creations were made long before SpyBat met his assistant. So, a few years ago, SpyBat wanted to make a gingerbread house too. He didn't follow a particular theme this time, but rather just made a house he thought might look pretty. He made the dough the night before, he made all the calculations for the blueprints, he baked the parts, he assembled them, and then he decorated the finished house. His assistant helped a bit, because sometimes it's just too difficult to get all the details right when you have wings and not hands with fingers. The pictures show SpyBat's gingerbread house project from a few years ago.

The 12 Days of Christmas I Die Rauhnächte - The rough nights*



*It's the twelve nights between Christmas and 6 January Between years

When you think of roughness, you think of cold, darkness, storms, ice and snow that were, at least in earlier times, actually typical for this time of the year. The Rauhnächte were, according to the rule of the farmer, also considered as determining the weather for the next twelve months.

What customs and traditions are associated with it?

In order not to disturb the spirits and demons that carry the earth in the form of ice winds or even connect them with their own home, it was necessary in the past to follow some rituals and customs that have survived at least in principle until today.

*So people didn't leave their homes at that time.
-You should not travel
*The servants were not allowed to work on the street.
-Do not work hard and never clean
*Do not bake
*Hanging clothes on the linen cord was also taboo: Passing demons could be tied in it, and a linen cloth (= shroud) on the linen cord could even be considered as a harbinger of death in the family.

*Farmers scented their houses and stables with incense and other herbs - it was supposed to ward off evil spirits.

But: The Rauhnächte has always been a time of inner reflection and reflection about what was and what may come. So they also do something constructive.





The wish oracle:

13 notes are labelled with a wish and thrown into a pot. Twelve of them are burnt - on every scorching night one - drawn and then burned, so that the spirits may take care of the fulfilment. You keep the 13th - for the fulfilment of this wish, are you responsible.

Dream interpretations during the Rauhnächte

Every night represents a month of the next year. Write down the dream after waking up to check what became true during the year. You should pay special attention to symbols, recurring situations and emotions.

Smoking and cleaning

The term "Raunächte" is derived - in some traditions - from the custom of burning incense. During the 12 nights, herbs, resins and woods are burned to rid the home of negative energies, to free itself from old burdens and evil spirits and to charge the house with positive energy for next year. So burning incence serves not only the physical purification, but also spiritual clarification. Special smoky mixtures were used, which varied according to regional tradition. In the past, incense was used primarily, but now there are popular herbal mixtures with sage or palo santo.

You can definitely use the usual incense cones / sticks!



*The term "time between years" for these indefinite days refers to a gap between the lunar and solar calendars. The lunar year is only 354 days long, 11 days are missing for the astronomically correct annual run of the sun. The century that unified the counting of time, the old year ended in large parts of Europe on 24 December, while the new one began on 6 January.

This book is set in December 2000, when Christmas, Chanukah, and Ramadan/Eid-ul-Fitr all fell within the same week. These three religions with their cultural expressions mix in this celebratory romance book filled to the brim with holiday spirit, friendship, and love.

It all starts when a plane on its way to Toronto is forced to land in a rural small town in Canada because the area is hit by the largest snow storm in over a decade. The passengers on the plane are forced to seek shelter at the inn in the little town, and we follow two main characters and their families and friends for a few days as their lives intertwine in the most unexpected way.

Anna was supposed to celebrate Christmas with her boyfriend's family. He seems to be the most perfect boyfriend but still she doesn't feel completely herself when she is with him, so maybe a detour and a delay could just be good for her? Even more so when she finds her way back to her Jewish roots through the help of a stranger. Maryam tries to hold her family together during Ramadan while also trying to save her little sister's big Indian muslim desi wedding from being cancelled because of the snow chaos. Strangers work together to help each other and also the people living in the small town, and as friendships form and new love find it's way, it becomes the most special holiday time of their lives.

The three perspectives of Christmas, Chanukah, and Ramadan brings a rarely seen depth in holiday romance books. It's perfect for snuggling up under a blanket with a hot beverage, to really get into the Christmas/Chanukah/Ramadan/wedding spirit of the season!

Bandit's Grandma's Famous Pumpkin Seeds (American units)

Human's mom's pumpkin seeds are always a hit during the holiday season. When making something with a fresh pumpkin, save those seeds and turn them into a tasty treat!

Ingredients:

whole medium sized pumpkin
 cup melted butter/margarine
 tablespoons smoked paprika
 teaspoon seasoned salt

Method:

Cut a hole in the top of the pumpkin. Remove the innards. Save the rest of the pumpkin for another recipe. Wash the innards over the sink in a strainer, picking out the orange bits. Line a baking tray with foil and preheat the oven to 375°F/191°C. In a pan, combine the seeds with the melted butter/margarine, then add the smoked paprika and salt Add more paprika and salt if needed (seeds should be quite covered in it). Bake in the oven for 30-40 minutes or until crispy (not burnt). Enjoy! They should taste slightly smoky and salty.
